Funding Sources for Community Gardens

Your community:

Make sure the community knows what you are doing. They may donate or want to participate
in another way. Contact community members/ groups, i.e. Rotary, Lions, Elks clubs, Boy/Girl
Scouts, city council, etc.

Nurseries and gardening stores:

 Contact local nurseries and/ or gardening stores to see if they would donate seeds, seedlings, starter containers (if you plan to start seeds indoors).

Home Improvement centers:

• Consider Home Depot and Lowe's for donations or discounted prices on containers, soil/compost, lumber, or other construction materials, i.e. hardware, landscape cloth, etc.
